Message from the Chair and ED

In many ways, 2017/18 was a year for NYWC to take stock and prepare to launch forward. We came to the end of our Strategic Plan and started conversations to inform the next one. We are proud to report that we were successful in achieving each of the four strategic priorities identified: that is, collaboration, responsiveness, effectiveness and innovation. Our goal for the upcoming year is to develop a new strategic plan, one that will determine the areas that we will focus on over the next few years to achieve our mission and vision.

It has been three years since we began co-locating with like-minded organizations at 116 Industry Street. Sharing space has provided a variety of opportunities to learn from and about each other and engage in activities that support our common goals. While some collaborations have been formal ones, the majority have been informal, born organically from interactions in the 'Town Square' or other common areas in the building. Over the last year, we have worked to develop workplace violence prevention initiatives with ONESTEP, helped North York Harvest Food Bank volunteers respond to disclosures of family violence and presented workshops to women attending English language classes at the Learning Enrichment Foundation. Referral and client support flow organically and seamlessly between service providers in the building, to the benefit primarily of individuals who come to the building for support but also to the staff and volunteers whose job it is to provide it.

NYWC spearheaded two events this year that engaged the local community while bringing together building partners and community leaders. On December 6, we hosted an event commemorating the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women. For a precious 15 minutes, people left their classrooms, offices and workstations to remember the 14 women who were singled out for their gender and murdered in the 1989 Montreal Massacre, missing and murdered indigenous women and girls, and all women who have faced violence simply because they are women. For many of the newcomers in the building, it was the first time they had heard about this part of our history.

We ramped up our tradition of celebrating International Women's Day this year by hosting our first Women's Entrepreneurship Festival. Over 100 people attended the event and learned more about entrepreneurship as an opportunity for women's empowerment and economic independence. The event included workshops, networking sessions and a marketplace showcasing successful food enterprises run by newcomer women living in the local community.

None of this would have been possible without the support of our funders and donors, the dedication of our Board, staff and volunteers, and the confidence of our community members. We are very proud to lead a team committed to contributing their best efforts as individuals and working collectively to empower women and effect positive change. Together, we are working towards our vision of having all doors open for all women.




Reclaiming Yourself After Abuse

Women's Empowerment Series – Discovering our Power






Where I am after completing the program (0=disagree, 10=agree)


