# A Message from the Chair & Executive Director

The 2018/19 year began with the launch of a new website: one that is more accessible and easier to navigate. Our IT infrastructure was updated as well, ensuring that our data is secure and making it easier for staff and volunteers to collaborate. These basic yet important elements helped set the tone and spirit for the year to come.

The Women's Empowerment Series continued to be at the heart of NYWC's programming. We were able to extend the geographic reach of the program in 2018, to Etobicoke and East York, through new partnerships with Stonegate Community Health Centre and Bangladesh Centre and Community Services. We welcomed new partners and strengthened long-term collaborations with Downsview Community Legal Services, Parya Trillium Foundation, and Unison Health and Community Services, among others.

We dipped our toes into the delivery of a digital literacy program for women over the summer months. This is a new program area for NYWC and one that we are still learning about. We are also exploring programming that strengthens key employability skills. In response to identified needs and requests of support in these areas, we hope to launch an employability program in 2019 and digital literacy in 2020.

A major flood in August caused considerable disruption and frustration but did not stop us from moving forward. We thank everyone for their support and patience.

We began to mark a milestone anniversary this year: NYWC was incorporated in October 1988, setting the foundation for securing charitable registration status and beginning to deliver services the following year. The organization's vision and mission are still very relevant today and the guiding principles remain the same: promoting equity, equality and social and economic justice for all women; and working within a framework of anti-oppression, anti-racism and feminism. After 30 years we are still going strong.

The highlight of the year was our third Women's Entrepreneurship Festival. Over 100 people came out to see the premiere of our short film Table Talk: Seven Women Share Their Entrepreneurship Journey and meet the inspirational women behind it.

We are extremely proud of NYWC's accomplishments over the year and the people who made it happen: our dedicated staff, board, volunteers and community partners. It is a privilege and honour to serve as Board Chair and Executive Director.

Looking ahead, 2019-20 will be an exciting year as we mark three decades of delivering critical services to women in the community. We are excited to have been awarded over \$200,000 over the next four years from the Government of Canada. This funding will support a new strategic plan focused on building the organization's capacity and positioning it for future growth.






■ Where I was before participating in the program
